National Telecommunicator's Week April 14-20

Did you know that in most states 911 dispatchers are classified as "Office & Administrative Support"? There is a continued effort to get this classification changed to a "Protective Service Occupation" so they are recognized for the work they do every day to protect and serve the lives of first responders and the public. Office support positions don't give CPR instructions to a mother for her infant not breathing, they don't ask certain questions in order to decipher whether someone might be having a stroke or seizure. Normal "administrative positions" don't listen to someone taking their last breath, because they mentally and physically don't want to be in this world any longer. All of these types of calls come in to our center daily. They take a toll on the bodies and minds of our dispatchers.

A dispatcher that answers a call is the first one that has contact with someone having a bad day. They have to quickly process the information and determine what resources are needed. While using specific protocol, they acquire additional details while typing all of that information into the system. At the same time the dispatcher then relays the pertinent information to the responders. This information gives the first responder a better understanding of what they may be up against once they arrive on scene.




EMA Spotlight

DID YOU KNOW...?






Did you know the response and recovery phase for EMA includes actions such as:

Developing reports to share with county and state partners










APRIL 8, 2024 -
